■ What Is a “Yagura” ?

A **yagura** is a turret—one of the key architectural features of a Japanese castle.

Originally used as armories, yagura developed over time into sophisticated structures for surveillance, defense, and long-distance viewing as castle architecture evolved from the Sengoku to the early Edo period.

When visiting a **yagura**, look closely at its strategic placement, robust construction, and how its design reflects both military function and architectural ingenuity.

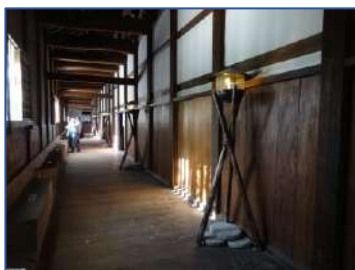

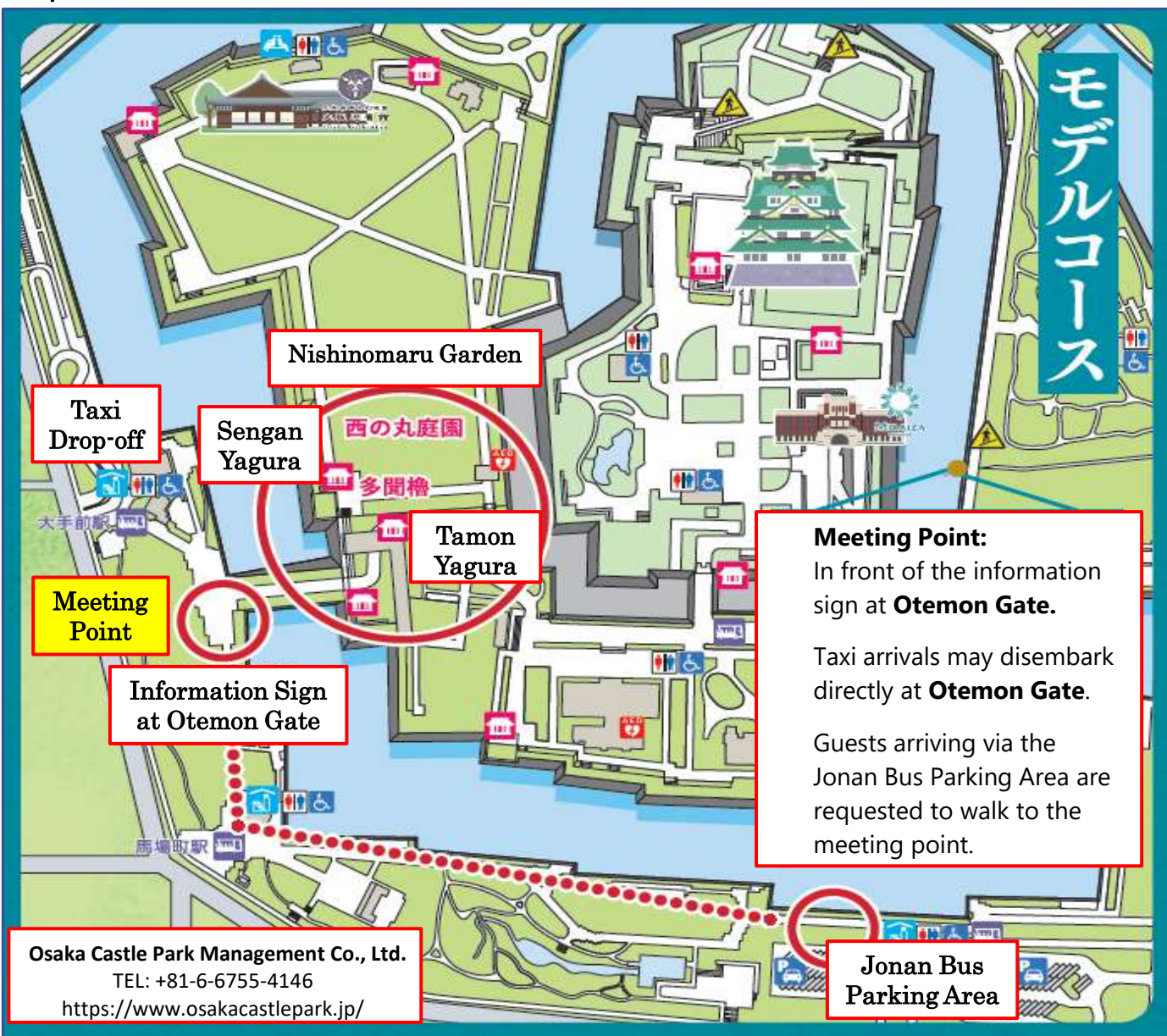

■The Experience

Guided by a knowledgeable specialist, guests are led from Osaka Castle's grand outer gate through its historic grounds before entering the turrets themselves. The carefully curated route enhances appreciation of both architecture and landscape, allowing guests to understand the turrets in relation to their surrounding environment—an experience rarely available, even to seasoned visitors of Japan.



■Guest Considerations

To preserve the historic integrity of the site ensure guest safety:

Restrooms are not available inside the turrets.
Eating and drinking are not permitted.
The interiors contain multiple steep staircases.
Shoes must be removed; slippers are provided.
